some of the creative opportunities available at Pinkerton's Library.

Libraries in general have undergone a sea of change in today's rapidly shifting world of information technology, and remaining relevant is one of their greatest challenges. Jennifer Warburton, Pinkerton's Director of Library and Media Services, is up to the task.

"The goal of libraries has always been to stay ahead of learning," according to Warburton, who has pursued that goal with great success. Under her guidance, Pinkerton's library has become a place that nurtures creative thinking and problem-solving skills.

Although Warburton playfully names graduate degrees as her, "drug of choice," her passion for discovery extends beyond her personal interests.

"I enjoy sharing the joy of learning," she says, and adds that the library's greatest success takes place when students learn to love learning—and they are doing just that.

Warburton is greatly appreciated by Pinkerton's students, and their enthusiasm for the library's events is so contagious that both administrators and teachers use these activities as incentives. Students struggling with disciplinary issues and classwork look forward to spending time at the library as a reward for good behavior or reaching academic goals.

Last year, the library introduced Friday "Makerspace" activities, which are always handson and often span a number of disciplines. Recently, there have been a series of engineering challenges utilizing only plastic straws and masking tape. Students with and without engineering interests swarmed the library to produce towers, competing for height, stability, or weight-bearing characteristics. Makerspace has even hosted boat design contests, complete with races.

Another enormously successful program at the library is *ThinkTank*, an initiative connecting students to external resources to help them realize a specific goal. Last year, *ThinkTank* enabled a group of students to enter the Samsung Solve for Tomorrow contest and travel to Washington D.C. to pitch their project to Samsung's CEO. The group placed in the top ten nationwide and won \$50,000 in Samsung technology for Pinkerton. Other student projects have included a science and math tutoring group and a political journalism group that ultimately received press passes to cover the 2017 Presidential Inauguration on site.

The addition of chess sets and other strategy games to the library has broadened social networks, as labels and cliques dissolve in the excitement and pressure of the game. Students are teaching each other how to play, and pairs are commonly made up of individuals whose social circles may never have overlapped outside the library. Chess has experienced a hearty revival, and the library's chess sets are in constant use. While some of this fervor for chess stems from the thrill of competition, Warburton also notes that chess—like reading—is a stable, linear activity that promotes concentration and gives students a satisfying contrast to the unnatural pace and high-stimulus environment of electronic media.

Changes in the patterns of childhood are closing many opportunities for young people to engage in the hands-on, self-guided learning that once took place naturally in the backyard. Warburton is

a master facilitator who epitomizes her own belief in the power and joy of lifelong learning. Her progressive model has placed Pinkerton's library at the forefront of learning, transforming it into a safe, comfortable space where the buzz of collaboration is not just allowed, but encouraged.

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

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A Letter from Griffin Morse, Headmaster



MACK ATHLETIC PLAQUE, A FAMILY RIVALRY

Back in 1976 when Londonderry had completed the construction of its own high school, they morphed into a new model for their relationship with Pinkerton...much like a grown sibling who chose to leave town but stay close. A Londonderry father and son, Wallace (Trustee from 1949-1974) and Andrew (Trustee from 1974-1982) who both served on the Pinkerton Board of Trustees saw long-term benefit in preserving that family tie between the towns so, in 1983, the school that amassed the most victories in the fall contests was awarded The Mack Athletic Plaque.

The Mack Athletic Plaque brings more than two schools together. From its inception, the Mack Plaque challenge acknowledges that brothers, sisters, parents, even grandparents might have attended the other school so the lines were not drawn for separation but blurred for the congenial nature of a family rivalry and that competitive but playful feeling between these two great institutions continues today in the same original spirit. Every fall when the teams are pitted against one another you hear those conversations throughout the day. Halftime or throughout the contests along the sidelines it is not unusual to see a sprinkling of red with blue t-shirts, red or blue pompoms, red or bluepainted faces and plenty of laughter and good fun, sometimes ignoring the scoreboard completely! It comes as no surprise that online cross-fire sometimes plays out in videos, raps, tasteful images and playful odes in the local newspapers to taunt and goad the opponents with good banter and playful satire.

My favorite aspect of the rivalry is unquestionably the Mack Plaque Captains' Lunch which always occurs the Thursday before the weekend of sports contests starts and, just as it says, the captains of each team sit to eat lunch with the other school's captains of their sport. Not only do these

talented leaders and revered athletes take time out of school to break bread together but they, along with their coaches and Athletic Directors, make respectful, encouraging speeches to one another, promising good sportsmanship, their best play and the desire to bring out the best in their own spectators. They set a tone and the meal is consistently the most timeless element of the rivalry: it feels like a celebration of traditional family values of courtesy, respect and responsibility. It invokes the joys, playfulness and wish for success that all healthy families want for one another even if it is at the mercy of their own family!

The fact that both schools have flourished in every way since 1974 when they parted ways is reflected in the scale of enrollment at both schools and their families' involvement in the school cultures. It is estimated that over 7,000 attend the Mack Plaque football matchup, which means a lot of opportunity at the gate. Well, both sides have been committed for years to the inspirational program, *NH Tackles Hunger*, for this unique rivalry and it routinely brings the most food in the state to our less fortunate communities. The results for this September's football game alone, for example, were:

Food Donations: 4326 pounds of food Money Donations: \$6068.29

Whether you have family on the other side of the rivalry or not, who can resist the good fun, the high level of athleticism and the shared joy these teams from these two great schools bring us in one week of rivalries? All fall sports come alive and so does the entire region because this legendary rivalry comes from the heart of all of us — it comes from family. $\stackrel{\wedge}{}$

Greg had a better arm than I and was a stalwart pitcher for PA. As we compared notes of old, I asked him if he would submit a bio and he did. I am hoping others will follow, so we can enjoy reading about your past endeavors.

"First summer out of high school I worked at Hood Farm with Larry Harding and Herb Hanson. I worked at Standard Sash and Door in the fall and then worked at KlevBro in the winter with Walter Hanf (Sally's father) and Alphonse Kelly (remember him?), a onetime classmate of ours 'til he left school, in the shipping department. In May it was off to Alaska to try to catch some work fighting forest fires. Ray Richardson '55, went with me. My older brother, Bill, started doing this in 1956, when he went to Claremont College in California after discharge from the Army. Not a good fire season for money, but made enough to go to Mexico City College in Mexico City. Got as far as Claremont, CA with a friend who lived there but Mexico would not let me into country without parent consent and my mother wouldn't do it. So, I went back to Derry.

"Winter of '59-'60 Bob Boulter and I worked at Impco in Nashua and our boss was Herb Hanson's dad. Don't remember how or why we ended up there but do know that's where Bob met his lovely wife, Lucy. In May I was off to Alaska again. I made enough fighting fire to go to school but came home to UNH because of great in-state tuition. I went to UNH until January of '64 and back to Alaska each summer between school years for fire work. In November of '63 I applied for job as smokejumper in Alaska at urging of some jumper friends who I'd met on fires (and in bars). Much to my surprise and delight I got the job! I dropped out of school as I had to report for work on the first Monday in April. Went through six weeks of training and parachuted to five fires that summer before breaking my ankle. We could work 180 days as seasonal employees, so I transferred to a survey crew and worked until October. Three other guvs and I were now very concerned about the draft and learned that the only Army Reserve unit that had openings in the country was at Ft. Wainwright right there in Fairbanks, so we joined. Basic Training was at Ft. Leonard Wood, MS and Truck Driver School at Ft. Dix, NJ. I got out just in time to go home for a week and then back to Fairbanks for work.

"I jumped from '64 to '69. All fires were in Alaska except in August of '67 I jumped seven fires in Montana and Idaho. I was promoted to Squad leader in '66 and was proud to be first Alaska trained jumper to be so promoted and one of only a handful to do that after only two seasons of jumping.

"I returned to UNH the fall of '65 and '66 to finish school and in the fall of '68 decided it was time to do something different so I took the LSAT at the University of Alaska and also had to take a four hour Spanish course so UNH would give me a degree so I could get into law school.

"I started Willamette University College of Law in August of 1969 and graduated in May of 1972. I liked Salem so decided to stay there after passing the bar exam that summer. Got married in May of '70 and spent summers of '70 and '71 back in Alaska fighting fires some more.

I was elected president of law class both the second and third year. I spent five years in practice and three at the City Attorney's office before being elected to a judgeship in the District Court in May of '80. Started that job in January of '81 and had also been a Juvenile Hearings Referee for three years while in practice. I was humbled to receive the highest rating of 58 District Court Judges in '82. I was elected to be a Circuit Court Judge in May of '86 and was appointed by the Governor to that job in August. Became Presiding Judge of our judicial district in '90 and served until '95. In '96 became vice president of Oregon Circuit Judge's Association and president in '97. I retired in June of 2003 when it became apparent that my wife Susan's cancer was winning the battle.

"Along the way we had Jocelyn ('78) and Mark ('82). She lives in Salem and has four children. She finished number one in her law class in 2004, but spent less than a year in practice before becoming a full-time mom. Some of you may remember she came to the 1988 reunion. Anne Parker **(AP)** Tell me about your Pinkerton experience: Who were the teachers who influenced you most and why?

Jonathan Baker (JB) I grew up Derry, less than two miles away. My mother (Patricia Ferland '74) encouraged me to run for class president freshman year and asked, I quote "if not you, then who?" It's interesting the simple things that can motivate. I was president all four years '89-'93. I wasn't necessarily academically strong, my joke was I had the lowest GPA in student council, but I was excited to accomplish things. I was energized by the students and teachers around me and I wanted to be a part of that. I was introduced to lacrosse my freshman year and guickly found a sport I enjoyed and could compete at, as I never really played sports until high school, though my father (David Baker '71) did take me to karate classes with Peter Murphy in my younger years. I finished my time on the varsity lax team as captain and academic All-American. All my coaches, but especially O'Reilly and Murphy taught me the rewards of leadership, a strong mind and a healthy body for life. I was also involved in Mogul Monsters - a

weekend ski group that gave me access to something I am still chasing to this day, snow. But most of all, it was the arts that I loved. I was always interested, but the quality and quantity of choices was a dream: fine art, architecture, painting, ceramics, woodworking and two of my most influential teachers, Alan Hall and Rolfe Voltaire. I spent every moment I could drawing and ultimately these skills culminated in my acceptance to the Rhode Island School of Design. Now 42, I feel extremely fortunate to have had such a wonderful childhood/young adult experience and my time at Pinkerton was some of the most influential and formative years of my life. Thank you for being a safe and inspiring place.

(AP) How and when did you decide to go into industrial design?

(JB) After graduation I studied architecture for one year at Roger Williams in Rhode Island. It was a well-regarded small school where I could also play lacrosse. Within six months I realized collegiate sports were not for me and my studio teacher introduced me to the field of industrial design. To me I.D. looked like small scale architecture that I could

build quickly and would allow me to draw more interesting forms. These things convinced me that I needed to change majors and become completely engulfed in the arts. I applied to the Rhode Island School of Design (RISD) with an industrial design major and spent three sleepless years in Providence fascinated with this new world of deep creativity.

(AP) What companies influenced your pursuit of creating American made, durable items?

(JB) I was awarded an internship at Patagonia my junior year at RISD. I've had lunch with Yvon Chouinard (creator of Patagonia) twice and to this day I am continually trying to create a product/business that can move the world in a more sustainable direction—one that "uses the principles of industrial design to reduce our environmental footprint and restore regional manufacturing," which is the mission statement of my business eqpd ("equipped"). I was also lucky enough to be a freelance designer for *Cascade Helmets*, the #1 manufacturer of lacrosse helmets in the world. I spent 15 years designing helmets and protective equipment, all of which were built in the USA. This gave me a real understanding of the connection between design and manufacturing and formed the perspective I have today—"that design creates jobs." If those designs are not being made here, then we are giving away one of the biggest benefits of good design—jobs.

(AP) Describe a typical day at the office/shop.

(**JB**) Being the founder of a start-up is relentless. I started eqpd about four years ago and it has taken every skill I've ever learned, from the classroom to the backcountry, and tested me on a national if not global level. I have big ambitions for eqpd because I know its foundation is honest and our ability to use design for everyone can help influence positive conversations within society. My days are spent doing a mix of shop tasks and production needs, refining messaging/marketing, editing, creating presentations for clients, book keeping, inventory, design reviews and a bit of philosophizing, dreaming and sketching.

(AP) What advice would you give current students? (JB) "If not you, then who?" If you have a dream, believe in it and work as hard as you can to accomplish it.

Bryan Geary **(BG)**: What year did you graduate? What are you up to now?

Taylor-Rae Lancaster **(TL)**: I graduated in the spring of 2016 and I'm currently living in Florida. I split my between working as a dog groomer (I love animals) and making YouTube videos.

BG: What are your best memories of Pinkerton?

TL: My senior year was fantastic because I was only there to take fun courses. I was in Video Production then I'd hop over and hang out in the Fine Arts building and draw in those classes.

BG: What made you want to get into video production? **TL:** I've been making videos since I was 12 years old and using *YouTube* as my platform. It's been a great deal of joy and really acts as a creative outlet for me; I'll probably be making videos forever.

BG: What made you want to submit the film for the National Student Production Awards?

TL: I made it with the intention to do so—my teacher [Mr. Lord] approved, and I thought it was a good film, so why not?

BG: It's been some time since you actually completed your film – did you ever imagine when you were working on it that it would win this type of honor?

TL: Not at all. I hoped it would get something, but definitely wasn't expecting it.

BG: Is "Sketchy" your favorite piece of work from high school?

BG: Was there one specific project or moment that made you realize filmmaking was something you were good at?

TL: Haha, does "Sketchy" count? I feel like that's a decent indicator that I'm not awful at filmmaking. (Kidding). I make children's videos and they tell me that they love my videos. If a kid says it, they're not gonna lie to keep your feelings intact.

BG: What advice do you have for students that want to get into video production and filmmaking?

TL: There's nothing about being creative that is easy. You have to be extremely self-disciplined and most importantly self-motivated, but there's nothing more satisfying than seeing your finished project. My favorite thing about filmmaking is designing characters and making the most out of an environment for artsy camera angles. It's all supposed to stem from enjoyment, but don't let frustration end a project too soon—trust me, I've been there.

BG: What does the future hold for you?

TL: I have every intention of going to college. I would like to get into a great art school and major in animation, and either take on a double major or a minor in filmmaking. I want to have my own cartoon and comic. I'd also like to write and publish books. It's all a process. I'll get there.
